## ESTATE DONATIONS POLICY

All designated (restricted) donated funds will be used for the sole purpose for which it was earmarked for by the donating family as soon as appropriately feasible, unless otherwise stipulated within the will of the deceased and/or original terms of the donation.

All undesignated estate funds are to be placed in an internally restricted reserve for the purpose of funding significant capital projects. In order for funds to be withdrawn, the executive director will create a proposal and relevant business case to be presented to the board. Pending board approval, the funds will be released for the design, necessary permitting, and construction of the project. Under no circumstances are the internally restricted estate donations to be used for general operating costs.

Until such a time that the internally restricted estate funds are used they are to held in a separate interest yielding bond account of limited risk exposure. Under no conditions are funds to be used to invest in stocks, shares, EFT's, or any other financial investment that contains inherent financial risk. All interest accrued will remain within the internally restricted estate fund.

This year was a little different; with the help of staff, clients invited other agencies to participate in the day's festivities. New friends joined old ones at Rehoboth's Community Access Centre for a variety of activities and of course, a delicious lunch! DARTS, Fisher Farms, and the Strive 2/3 Program were in attendance for a presentation on bullying and self advocacy before celebrating Rock Your Socks for World Down Syndrome Day by tie-dying their own socks! Rehoboth is blessed to work alongside other agencies for the betterment of all persons with disabilities, and there's no better way to choose kindness. A crowd favourite for the day was creating pink shirts with affirmations on them, now hanging on the pillars in the building. A continuous reminder to choose kindness above else as well as a reason to smile when you're feeling low.



## NEW BEGINNINGS

Change is hard for us all but as anyone can tell you, it's made easier with good support around you. When the New Beginnings home in Northwest Region welcomed a new roommate last August, staff were there to help everyone involved with the transition. Linda and Rena had previously been a female only household and Jonathan had lived on his own. This was a huge adjustment for

these three individuals, as well as their families. Rehoboth was there to assure all parties that this would continue to be a happy, healthy, and safe home for all; this made for the smoothest and most comfortable transition. The Bible says, "As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another". Being a roommate and having a roommate provides opportunities for true growth

and change. You can sharpen each other and grow into a more mature and other focused person. Jesus wants us to look at others' interests as more important than our own. What a beautiful way to practice this, living shoulder to shoulder, day to day, with a roommate.

As with any new roommate, Linda, Rena, and Jonathan, learned to live together. Adapting to each other's routines and adjusting where needed. The three have grown to be close, enjoying community outings together and with their friends and as well as simple fellowship at home, over meals and during times of relaxation. Staff have seen the growth (sharpening) of Linda, Rena, and Jonathan over the past year and are immensely proud of them!



# ROBIN'S BIG MOVE

Robin was living by herself in a suite at the 4-Plex in Edmonton when inflation hit her hard. Without competitive employment, Robin was struggling to make ends meet. Robin found herself bored at home, phoning her mom upwards of 47 times in a single morning sometimes or running laundry with only a few items multiple times in a day. Often, it was too expensive to get out in the community to do the things she wanted to go do, and some free options were simply not interesting enough to motivate her to go out. She struggled to afford the ingredients essential to a nutritious diet, and was faced with choices related to reducing purchasing certain food products (sugar alternatives, organic or gluten free varieties of bread and flour less likely to be exposed to glyphosate) or discontinuing use of her Norwex products, much to the distress of her family who put a great importance on avoiding chemicals commonly found in food, cleaners and cosmetics. Robin was faced with changing hair dressers, or simply having a nice hair cut but not being able to set aside any amount for retirement. Staff found it difficult to fulfill their purpose of facilitating community inclusion. It was clear that something needed to change.



Thankfully, Rehoboth makes room. It happened to be looking to fill a vacant position coming up at Bridgespan Café, so Robin and her family were approached and agreed to see if that might be a good solution to allow Robin some breathing room in her budget. As transportation was too costly a barrier for her, a number of people rallied to

offer her rides and volunteer their time while Robin was in training/assessment. For a number of weeks, Robin was assessed and trained in the café in Stony Plain office, to see if she might be ready for this independent employment opportunity at Bridgespan. All previous work placements were alongside her residential supports, so the hope was that the minimal support available at Bridgespan would be enough for her to make the jump. While in the past, barriers like cold weather or bad roads would cause her to cancel work, Robin showed immense dedication to her training at Rehoboth in the assessment phase. She was ready to go on -30 days at 7am for her ride, often telling her staff to "hurry up!" even as they walked to the car before snow removal had cleared the walks and before others had woken up for the day.

When it became clear after a time that more training and support would be necessary to prepare her for such independent competitive employment, it appeared that we would be at square one again, albeit with Employment Services willing to expand and help Robin search in Edmonton for employment that was suited to her skills. Obviously, this solution could take time and Robin was experiencing further decreases in her spending money, mileage allowance, and requests to reduce her grocery budget. After more brainstorming, the solution was discovered! There was someone who was employed and wanted to make the move to Edmonton to live in their own place, but needed to have support available around them. So, Robin and her family were offered a new opportunity... if that person wanted to move to Edmonton into Robin's old home, she could move to Spruce Grove where Robin could share costs with roommates, and attend our day program with employment preparation, honing her skills to work toward her dreams of more competitive employment.



In this new opportunity, Robin has truly begun to flourish! Just as in her training opportunity, she gets up every day and gets ready for work at the day program, exploring the development opportunities there. She looks forward to supported paid employment in the meantime via the many supported job contracts that employment preparation has, with the eventual goal to work at Bridgespan (unless she finds another job she wants more!). Robin is making the most of the day program, finally being able to attend social events and social / self-advocacy committee meetings in person. She's building many relationships for herself amongst the staff and other peers, and even has her mom attending events with her!

With continued hard work, and the full support of her growing circle, we're sure Robin will find her dream job and continue to flourish.


