ESTATE DONATIONS POLICY

All designated (restricted) donated funds will be used for the sole purpose for which it was earmarked for by the donating family as soon as appropriately feasible, unless otherwise stipulated within the will of the deceased and/or original terms of the donation.

All undesignated estate funds are to be placed in an internally restricted reserve for the purpose of funding significant capital projects. In order for funds to be withdrawn, the executive director will create a proposal and relevant business case to be presented to the board. Pending board approval, the funds will be released for the design, necessary permitting, and construction of the project. Under no circumstances are the internally restricted estate donations to be used for general operating costs.

Until such a time that the internally restricted estate funds are used they are to held in a separate interest yielding bond account of limited risk exposure. Under no conditions are funds to be used to invest in stocks, shares, EFT's, or any other financial investment that contains inherent financial risk. All interest accrued will remain within the internally restricted estate fund.

# FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



## NEW CONSTRUCTION IN LETHBRIDGE CHRISTOPHER PLACE

Construction is progressing very well on Rehoboth's new facility in Lethbridge: Christopher Place. At the time of this writing, drywall was up and taping and mudding is underway. By publication date, construction will be largely completed, and move-in date is December 1st.

You may be wondering about the name – Christopher Place. So let's step back in time...

In 1981, shortly after Rehoboth put down roots in southern Alberta, we began to support a young boy named Christopher. Through the years that we were privileged to support Christopher, from a little boy to a young man when the LORD called him home, we learned – as staff and as an agency – how to support people with love and commitment and faith. To give them opportunities to grow and develop, to have dignity and to flourish.

Now these lessons are well learned, and the memory of young Christopher will live on here at Christopher Place,

a 13,000 square foot mobile-friendly facility, home to 14 people with developmental and physical disabilities.

Our vision for Christopher Place is that it will be a flourishing part of the community in North Lethbridge. More importantly, we will help to build community inside Christopher Place with each resident living in their own studio apartment and enjoying family-style meals in the common dining room.

Christopher Place will meet standards set by the Supportive Living Accommodation Licensing Act, Environmental Public Health, and Creating Excellence Together (CET) Accreditation.

Funding to support the needs of the 14 residents will be graciously provided by the Disability Services department of Alberta Community and Social Services.

How did we all cope? A couple of our individuals took these months to walk as much as possible - even throughout the winter when it wasn't too cold! They are excited about the weight loss, increased energy and of course new clothes; and positive comments from family and friends while showing off in zoom calls are an added confidence boost.

Zoom became the new normal way to communicate and yet our hearts still broke for those we support when we would hear, "but I just want to talk to my family...not on a computer". Rehoboth support staff continued to encourage clients that eventually, they and the rest of the world would be together again.

After a few months, the Cavanagh home in Stony Plain wanted to do something significant to tangibly show how long the 'stay at home' really was. They came up with the idea of putting together a chain where every link would represent a day; never thinking or believing this would be over 17 months. That's a lot of links!

Each month is colored differently and at the end of every month the links would be joined, leaving everyone in shock that we were now into another month, and another and another!

The short of it is that we coped; some better than others, but we all leaned into a new normal while leaning on each other.

The morning of August 2 was celebrated as all clients returned to the Vocational Day Program; a glorious day for everyone as we staple the final (509th) link onto the chain!

David had an amazing gift with numbers and remembering people's birthdays. Often when he talked about someone's birthday, he would end up talking about his own. Well, that was good, too!

Woodybrook CRC (Lacombe) will now host the choir in November as part of the choir's tour and outreach program on behalf of Rehoboth Camp Ministries.

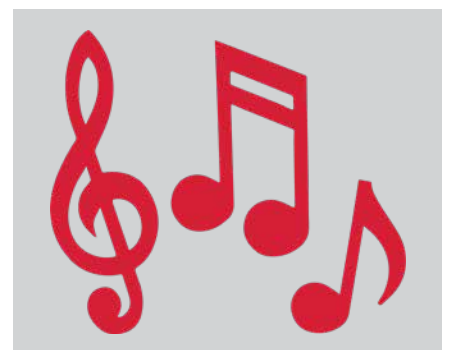
Singing in a post-covid environment is still a concern for children. Both face masks and shields will be part of the choir's protocol for the fall until COVID-19 issues are resolved.
